THOUGHTS AS WE LOOK FORWARD TO A NEW YEAR...

The first quarter of next year will look different than any other in the history of the Coyotes Curling Club. It's the first time that we will be experiencing an Olympic cycle in a building meant only for curling. The opportunities associated with this ought to make all of us excited and proud. For the first time in our history we will have the privilege of showing off our club to greater numbers than ever before.



The stated goal for this Olympic cycle is to add a minimum of 100 new members. Let that sink in for a minute. Integrating this many new members successfully won't happen by chance. It will take a concerted effort on the part of every one of us to expand our club in a successful and sustainable way. Doing so will reap great future rewards for all of us: lower league fees, more volunteers, new ideas and energy, and, who knows, a new teammate who turns out to be an incredible curler. The upside is huge, but in the short term this push is likely to cause a little stress and tension.

It's imperative that, internally, we work together through this busy time. We must support each other and dish out large helpings of flexibility, kindness and consideration. In that light, these are my New Year's Resolutions for the Coyotes Curling Club....

1. Curling is a sport with a long history and is steeped in great tradition. But in the same way that we now have a Mixed Doubles League and we are beginning a Wheelchair league, the sport has shown a willingness to evolve. Bringing that concept into the club, we are blessed to have both longstanding, charter members of the organization as well as dynamic new talent. The curlers who have played the sport for decades know what they're doing. We wouldn't be a club without them. We should listen to

them. But we've also been lucky to attract new curlers with interesting ideas. We need to be listening to them! Yes, we support the sport's history and what has been learned at other clubs, but **in order to grow our club, which is unique in its demographic and geography, we need to embrace change and try some new things!**

2. League and Membership dues alone are not sufficient to retire our debt and help us achieve a financially secure future. Corporate Learn to Curl also play an important role for this club. **Darryl Horsman** and I take phone calls for these events and book several each month. Learn to Curl contribute several thousand dollars to our club per month, and yet there are only about 8 or 10 of us who regularly help with these events. That has to change. Corporate events provide fantastic exposure for our sport and our club. Plus they're a ton of fun. Please, if you can make yourself available to help, do it. And if you're at the club when a group arrives, greet them warmly, help them set up, and make them feel at home. **We all need to adopt the attitude that we are hosts...every one of us...all the time!**

3. The contributions of every club member are valuable. There is great work being done and many hours logged by our volunteers, both visibly and behind the scenes. Our volunteers are the entire reason we are in our fourth year in this dedicated facility. However, I think we sometimes get bogged down a little in thinking that we have to do things the same way every time. For example, it's possible that two different people can chair a bonspiel in two different ways, and both be successful. It's possible that two different instructors can teach a new curler

in slightly different ways and both find success. **We must share our best practices, and then give each other space for our unique talents and gifts.** There's room for some variation in a volunteer organization. Let's start the new year by first thanking each other for the willingness to help, and then focus on uniformity in our volunteer efforts a little later in the year.

4. You may be familiar with the phrase "in any volunteer organization, 20% of the people do 80% of the work." That absolutely cannot be the case in this club, or we won't survive. The "work" of adding 100 new members in the first quarter of the new year is something that will require effort from 100% of us. If you've found time this year to practice, play in a league, work a make-up game or a practice game into your schedule, or competed anywhere, **I know you can find three hours per month to help someone new to the sport.** You'll love it! The enthusiasm and excitement of a brand new curler is infectious. Whether you've curled for 40 years, or 4 hours, you know more than someone walking into our club for the first time. Teach them something, and share what you love about the sport.

Bucky Marshall and his Olympic Committee and **David Twohig** and his Marketing Committee have done great work in positioning us to receive a huge number of excited people in the coming weeks. On Dec. 30th, we had 50 of them come through our door. Their joy in finding us and their enthusiasm for getting out on the ice was palpable. We had a great core group of members come out to meet them, answer questions, tend bar and run the on-ice stations. Thank you so much for the time each of you happily gave that night!

If you are asked to help out with one of our 20 upcoming events associated with the Olympics, please make it a priority and say "yes." Better still...don't wait to be asked. Familiarize yourself with the calendar and when we have scheduled Try Curling Open Houses, Beginner Leagues, Newbie Nights, etc. These are the "landing places" for new curlers. Come to the club and meet them!

There is a certain "vibe" with curling, and we all know it. The sport is unique and addictive...the people are fun and wonderful. It's time to remember that about each other and share it with everyone who walks in our door.

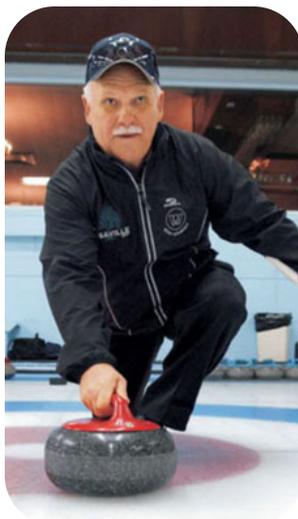
THE WRENCH

This week, we host the third annual **Golden Wrench Classic**, with some of the best of the best in men’s curling coming to play in hopes of hoisting that amazing giant Wrench!

This spiel is named for one of the legends in Canadian and International curling, **Ed Werenich**. Ed’s contributions to raising the profile of our sport can’t be overstated. Through the 1970s through to the late 1990s he was a force in men’s curling, and his style of play influenced many of the champions who followed. In the talent-deep province of Ontario, before **Russ** and **Glenn Howard**, before **Wayne Middaugh**, before **Mike Harris**, before **Greg Balsdon** or **John Epping** – there was the Wrench: two-time World champion, 10-time Brier competitor, master of the Skins game and, unarguably, the “King of the Rings.”

For their curling success, Ed and the three members of his 1983 championship team – **Paul Savage**, **John Kawaja** and **Neil Harrison** – were inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame and the Ontario Sports Hall of Fame. But it was Ed’s personality that called attention to the game as well, thanks to his outspoken nature and willingness to always call it as he sees it (not to mention offbeat events like the 1986 Battle of the Sexes exhibition game where his men’s team took on Marilyn Bodogh’s kilt-wearing world champion women’s team, but we digress).

Ed lives in Ontario, and is a frequent Arizona winter visitor (read: avid golfer), but how did it come to pass that a men’s bonspiel in Tempe would be named after a Canadian-born legend of the sport? Over to **Darryl Horsman** for the full story on that:



“As long as he’s come to Arizona, Ed has been a huge supporter of our club,” says Darryl. “He and Neil used to come down and mingle during the Desert Ice when we were back at the Ice Den.”

Side note: the late, great Neil “Harry” Harrison was Ed’s friend, teammate, fellow firefighter and a legend among leads. Proud to have a rock dedicated to him on CCC sheet C! Lead rock, of course! Now, back to Darryl:

“When it was decided that we should host a WCT event here, we thought naming it for Ed would be a good way to thank a man (and team) for all they’ve contributed to the game. Harry was also a huge supporter of curling in AZ as well as the USA, as he coached **Patti Lank** for a couple of years two Olympic trials ago. It seemed right to call it the Wrench! I called Eddie and asked if he would like that and he said yes!”

Ed was here to watch the action and present the trophy to the winning teams the past two years. In its first year, the champion team was skipped by fan favorite (hello, Saskatchewan contingency) **Pat Simmons**. Last year, the title went to Manitoba’s **Mike McEwen**. Other obligations are preventing Ed from being here to present the trophy to the 2018 winners in person, but you know he’ll be watching the leaderboard from afar!

We hope all Coyotes members will come out to watch some great curling at CCC this weekend, and while you’re here, raise a glass to one of our sport’s greats. Good curling, to our hometown Coyotes teams and to all of our guests!

CLUBMATE’S CORNER

This week’s Clubmate is Louis Maconi!

Have you ever sat in the Broken Broom, watching a guy color the label of his beer bottle with a Sharpie, and wondered: who is that font-obsessed man? Well, next time, after you pass him the Sharpie, say hello to **Louis Maconi**, this week’s clubmate!



Louis was born and raised in the Bronx, he moved to Arizona in 1990. He didn’t curl in New York, though; he waited until just about four years ago to pick up the sport right here in AZ.

“I first discovered curling during the 2010 Olympics, when I and some of my gambling buddies caught the bug watching it and betting on the games. At that time, the club was still playing at the Ice Den, and I tried to get into LTC classes there, but kept getting frozen out (pun intended). Eventually, I gave up. I was living in Mesa, and it was a long drive anyway.”

Flash forward. “Four years later, I was sitting with club member **Teal Black** in a bar in Mesa, having a beer, and they had the 2014 Olympics on the TV, and curling came on. At some point, I said to Teal, ‘I always wanted to try that.’ And he said he’d be willing to try it with me.”

Louis used good old Google to find our club and saw that we were in the new facility in Tempe. He signed up for one of the first LTC classes held at our dedicated facility, and the rest is history.

Since becoming a member, Louis has been a steady competitor, volunteer and club supporter. In fact, he is the member who sold last year’s winning \$10,000 raffle

ticket in our main fundraiser – to his sister’s boyfriend. “They were here visiting, and came to see the club and watch me play in a league match on a Friday night. He was so taken with club and the sport. Selling him a ticket was easy; I think he’d have bought it just to look good in front of my family, but he seemed genuinely happy to support the club.”

When he’s not curling, Louis plays disc golf (also with Teal). He’s an avid poker player (watch for him at the World Series of Poker Seniors Championship in June!) and he also makes wine – in his kitchen! “I use prepared juice kits. They come out pretty good!”

A guy’s gotta pay the bills, too, and to do so Louis writes software for General Motors, specifically to support the manufacturing process. He also freelances as a proofreader for authors, journalists and students (and the occasional curling club flyer).

Louis is pretty well-known around the club for his sharp observational wit, and here’s what he has observed about his fellow Coyotes members. “It’s just a solid group of good people. Of course, the fact that they’re willing to have me in their club makes them suspect...”

CLUBMATE'S CORNER

We just love the time of year when the out-of-state license plates start showing up in the club parking lot. This week we give a warm welcome back to one of our favorite snowbirds: **Lyn Perry!**

Lyn's home is Kelowna B.C., but she spends 180 days a year here in Arizona to golf and, lucky for us, to curl.

She started curling when she was 11 and had a stellar career. In 1980, she represented Alberta at the Canadian Ladies Curling Association Championship (now the Scotties Tournament of Hearts) finishing fourth (won by **Marj Mitchell**, both **Marilyn Bodogh** and **Colleen Jones** were at that one, too). She next took her skills and experience to B.C. where she skipped a team at the 2006 Provincials (**Kelly Scott** won the Province and the World's that year), she won the Kelowna cash spiel with **Penny (Ryan) Shantz**, and she spared for **Linda Moore** on a team skipped by **Lindsey Sparkes** in Vancouver.

[As someone who has followed Canadian ladies' curling for many years – I say WOW. *shamelessly fangirling*]

Lyn's 1980 teammates are still great friends and all are going to the 2018 Men's World's in Las Vegas. "It'll be a super reunion after 38 years!! Can't wait!"

Lyn heard about CCC in 2015 when she was living in N.W. Peoria. It was the sign "We speak Canadian here" that told her she was in the right place. She signed up as a spare, and in no time at all was playing in bonspiels,

getting on teams and getting lots of help as she waged her return to the sport after taking eight years off.

"I love the volunteer atmosphere, all the friendly people, the push to teach new curlers and grow the club. It is just a joy to be here," Lyn says.

She's also an avid golfer. "I started golf at 35, and found out that all the sports wins I had had over the years didn't prepare me for the hardest game there is. It made me crazy until I figured out I was never going to make the LPGA, so now when I flub a shot, I just laugh hysterically."

Lyn sees similarities, and some differences, between the two sports. "Both require strong concentration and trust in your own body to do what it knows how to do, if you just get out of your own way and let it happen. Both have a lot of mental challenge, reading ice and reading greens, where you can miss and where you can't, stamina, athleticism, positive attitude, all that."

"Differences are that one is a team of four that requires more communication with each other, and golf is just you, but if you communicate well with the people you are playing with, congratulating for good shots, being a good sport, both sports are very social (especially when the game is done)."

Lyn works on and off as a consultant, reads a lot, walks her dog, takes Pilates, looks after her 99 year old dad, volunteers with curling and golf events...and fixes her husband's computer once a day.
